Director's Monthly Report

March 2025



March was a busy month, for March—not like a summer month, but busy for March. While we had fewer people in the library than last year, primarily due to few programs than last year. Sundays are popular, nearly as busy as Saturdays. Wednesday evenings continue to be the slowest times, unless we have an evening program. (Thursday evening likely would be similar, though we always have a program on Thursday nights.) In March we launched our countywide community read of *Braiding Sweetgrass*, by Robin Wall Kimmerer, which runs through May. The spring program calendar is very full as a result. March was also dominated by building issues (roof, pavilion, and generator), and, since the executive order of March 14 cutting the IMLS, with advocacy at both the state and federal levels. In March, both the Hillsdale and Ancram town boards passed resolutions in support of the library and of state and federal funding for libraries. Copake and the town board of supervisors did so in early April. Taghkanic is proposing a similar resolution at its board meeting on April 14. We have spoken with reporters at a number of local media and a number of articles have been published on the issue and its local implications. Some grant funding has already been compromised. We will need to keep tabs on developments over the next several months and on the impact on our income.




Library Usage:


Overall circulation shot up in March, this time led by traditional media, mainly print books. Perhaps the cold, unpleasant weather encouraged more reading? Or perhaps people wanted some form of escape from the news. In any case, circulation of library materials was higher than any other March in recent years, and our 2025 numbers are an undercount, since we still are not able to get our Blackstone Audiobook numbers (we hope to in the next week or two). Even without those numbers, checkouts of audiobooks were up 27% over 2024; audiobooks continue grow in popularity faster than any other format. Checkouts of print and e-books are also up since last year, with checkouts of videos, DVDs, and books on CD down. We are no longer purchasing books on CD (indeed we just weeded a large number of them that have not gone out in years) and are purchasing fewer DVDs, especially since many titles are no longer being released in that format. Paid video streaming services are often the only option for many titles, perhaps accounting for the decline in downloads of videos on Kanopy and hoopla as well, since the most current titles do not appear on those platforms. Or, people are just reading more instead of watching TV.
















Staffing and Professional Development:

Building and Grounds

- Larkin says will install our event sign soon—when warms up a bit.
- Leaks have continued—Jay plans to replace roof week of April 14.
- Plan for pavilion and generator approved by Copake Planning Board. Working on getting permit for generator. Copake has waived building permit fees.
- Received paperwork from DASNY on CREST grant for the generator—will submit required
 documentation after getting final quote for pad from BCI. Herrington's has been here and
 approved location for tank and also asked about possibility of an underground tank.
- Kim Hausner will be assembling a donated storage bin for our trash and recycling bins that will be on the east end of the library, to provide more space in the kitchen and cleaning supply closet.

Grants/Fundraising:

- Received grant from Berkshire Taconic Community Foundation to continue English language program for another year (\$5400)
- Received grant from CREATE for music programs (\$2500), but did not receive an arts education grant for art workshops. We plan to hold some of these anyway.
- Applied to the Rheinstrom Hill Family Foundation for funding.
- Have heard that Humanities NY funding for our reading and discussion series may not come through due to cut to the National Endowment for the Humanities and their funding of state humanities councils. Humanities NY is crunching the numbers to see what they can do and will let us know soon.

- Robin completed weeding the Books on CD collection, freeing up one whole row of shelves, providing us with much needed space, especially in the nonfiction section. She has begun shifting the fiction to provide space in nonfiction.

- Fran is working on organizing a Volunteer Day, in conjunction with the community read, for May 3.
